

Work clothing and personal protective equipment (PPE)



A helmet is designed to protect you if you could be hit by objects and/or if you could bump your head on an immovable object.

Electrical work

Work and repairs on electrical installations may only be carried out by qualified electricians.

The following 5 safety rules must be observed:

- 1. Disconnection: Disconnection refers to the disconnection of all poles in an electrical system from live parts.
- 2. Secure against being switched on again.
- 3. Ensure no voltage is applied.
- 4. Earth and short-circuit.
- 5. Cover or fence off adjacent live parts.

Water & sewage

Connect the red hose (fresh water) to the "inlet".

Connect the red hose (waste water) to "waste water".

Danger of mix-ups!

Make sure that the hoses are connected correctly. In the event of a mix-up, there is a risk that the fresh water network will be contaminated.

Hitching a trailer with drawbar



When hitching trailers to tractor units, do not stand between them and do not hold the drawbar up by hand.

There is a danger that you will be crushed.

This is the right way to do it:

- 1. When hitching trailers, adjust the drawbar to the correct height beforehand,
- 2. Then step out of the area between the trailer and the tractor unit and guide the person driving.
- Only step back to connect the electric and brake lines between the trailer and the tractor after hitching.

Securing a trailer



Reliable container securing







Securing containers with twistlocks on the loading area

- Push up the tensioning nut (A) and turn it 90° so that the pivot pin you can see in the hole is at right angles to the direction of travel.
- 2. Tighten the clamping nut and
- 3. Insert the safety device (B) so that the clamping nut can no longer turn.





Crane operation





• to the hands if the load is set down faster than expected.

Crane operation



There is a danger of being hit or crushed by the load as well as a danger to your feet if you are not wearing safety shoes and the load is set down.






Always wear a helmet when using a crane. This protects your head if the load swings. Do not guide loads directly by hand, but with a guide rope. Wear gloves when doing this. This way your hands are protected and you can stay at a sufficient distance from the load.

It is **forbidden** to ride standing up while the ride is ongoing! There is a danger that you could fall down.

(Exception when collecting the ride chips when the ride is moving very slowly)



Risk of falling and injury if you jump off while driving.





While the ride is ongoing, stay in the designated areas outside the hazard area and keep an eye on the ride and the guests. It is best to stand outside the barricades.



If you stand too close to the ongoing ride there is a hazard of being struck or hit by the ride or passengers.

X



Never try to pick up lost objects in the hazard area while the ride is moving.

This may only ever be done after the ride has stopped and by arrangement with the person in the ride stand.







After checking the safety bars or other safety devices, leave the hazard area and give the agreed signal to the ride stand that the ride can begin.
